## **RESOLUTION NO. 11**

1 2 3	WHEREAS, the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine (AACOM) core competencies for osteopathic medical students includes applying "evidence-based guidelines throughout the scope of practice"; and
4 5 6 7	WHEREAS, evidence-based medicine is "conscientious, explicit, judicious and reasonable use of modern, best evidence in making decisions about the care of individual patients" through integrating "clinical experience and patient values with the best available research information"; and
8 9 10	WHEREAS, Crisis Pregnancy Centers (CPCs) are nonprofit organizations that falsely present themselves as healthcare clinics while providing pregnancy options counseling that does not include all of a patient's options <sup>3,5</sup> ; and
11 12 13	WHEREAS, informed consent, as defined by the Joint Commission, must include "the nature of the procedure, the risks and benefits and the procedure, reasonable alternatives, and risks and benefits of alternatives" <sup>8</sup> ; and
14 15	WHEREAS, the United Nations recognizes abortion as "a key component of health services" which directly translates to improved maternal and infant mortality rates <sup>6</sup> ; and
16 17	WHEREAS, only 26% of CPCs have a registered nurse and 16% have a board certified physician on staff $^{\!3}$ ; and
18 19 20	WHEREAS, CPCs are nonmedical entities that are not held to safety, inspection, and regulation requirements that medical facilities are subject to, including the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act <sup>2,3</sup> ; and
21 22 23 24	WHEREAS, CPCs often fail to disclose that their volunteers have no formal medical training while simultaneously providing ultrasound services where they may intentionally overestimate gestational age for the purpose of making women believe they are beyond the legal limit for accessing abortion <sup>2,3,4</sup> ; and

25 26 27	WHEREAS CPCs educate their clients with false claims about side effects of abortions, including mental health repercussions, higher incidences of breast cancer, abortion reversal procedures, and infertility that have been disproven <sup>2,3,4</sup> ; and
28 29	WHEREAS, in a study of 348 CPC websites, over 80% had false or misleading claims <sup>2</sup> , including the terms "abortion clinic" where they do not provide these services <sup>4</sup> ; and
30 31	WHEREAS, CPCs do not provide evidence-based medicine and do not provide comprehensive contraception services <sup>2,5</sup> ; and
32 33	WHEREAS, rates of teen abortions decreased by 40% in Colorado when access to evidence-based contraception, like long-acting reversible contraceptives increased <sup>2</sup> ; now, therefore be it
34 35	RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) discourage medical student and resident training in Crisis Pregnancy Centers (CPCs); and, be it further
36 37 38	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP research developing educational materials for student, resident, and attending physician members about the potential dangers CPCs pose to women obtaining comprehensive reproductive healthcare; and, be it further
39 40	RESOLVED that ACOFP encourages physician members to avoid referring pregnant patients to CPCs for options counseling; and, be it further
41 42	RESOLVED that the ACOFP support legislation requiring CPCs to provide accurate information on their websites regarding the services they provide.

## FINAL ACTION: DISAPPROVED as of March 29, 2023

Explanatory statement: Recommend disapproval as this resolution has potential for impacting the patient-physician relationship by limiting physician referrals and limiting access to medical education. It is not the purview of the ACOFP to direct where colleges of osteopathic medicine (COMs) train their students and state educational material is provided by other organizations, such as the American College of Osteopathic Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOOG).
