RESOLUTION NO. 3

RESOLVED, that the Congress of Delegates 2021 resolution on Climate Change of the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) be APPROVED as a white paper submitted by the ACOFP Board of Governors.

Climate Change White Paper

Climate change is defined as a range of global patterns including global warming, sea level rise, ice mass loss, shifts in flower/plant blooming and extreme weather events. International studies have identified several consequences of climate change including heatwaves, storms, fires, droughts, floods, and agriculture loss resulting in health-related consequences, such as an increase in undernutrition, cardiovascular disease, respiratory disease, and vector borne disease. The World Health Organization 2014 assessment estimates an additional 250,000 potential deaths annually between 2030 and 2050 due to the impacts of climate change. Therefore, the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) membership have called for action to reduce or reverse climate change and address the negative health consequences that occur as a result of climate change.

The ACOFP recognizes that climate change poses a direct threat to public health. Climate change seriously impacts all populations; however, it can disproportionately affect vulnerable populations. In our commitment to protecting patients from the negative health consequences of climate change we will endorse and promote local, state, and federal initiatives that battle climate change. Further, as an organization we commit to addressing climate change in the following ways:

- 1. Commitment to Sustainability Standards
 - a. ACOFP will strive to meet industry standards with use of sustainable products when planning events.
 - b. ACOFP staff will address sustainability practices and take these into consideration when choosing conference venues.
- 2. Providing Virtual Options for Continued Education
 - a. in 2020 the ACOFP had it's first virtual conference due to the COVID 19 pandemic. The ACOFP vows to continue to make a virtual option for continuing

30 31		medical education, which conserves gas emissions, helps reduce environmental waste, etc. which contributes to a reduction in climate change.
32	3.	Supporting Research
33 34 35		a. ACOFP will work with the liaison to the Osteopathic Family Physician Journal to encourage research and publications regarding the health impacts of climate change.
36	4.	Developing Education
37 38 39 40		 a. ACOFP shall offer education regarding the public health implications of climate change. Education shall include relevant current events and at risk populations, identification of health related complications and appropriate medical interventions.
41 42 43		 ACOFP will develop education that will enable members to educate patients, their community, and lawmakers about the health consequences of climate change.
44	5.	Producing Resources
45 46 47		 The ACOFP will prepare a list of resources on climate change and its health impacts to be published on the ACOFP website to adequately educate physicians and patients.
48 49		 The ACOFP will support the development of education for patients and physicians regarding the health impacts of climate change.
50	6.	Engagement of Committees and Work Groups
51 52 53		a. As climate change is widespread and a large topic to tackle as an organization, the ACOFP shall honor above commitments through the work of its various committees and work groups as applicable.

Due to the disproportionate impact of climate change on specific groups (women, children and minorities), appropriate committees and/or work groups will be encouraged to address climate change within their own purview. This may include developing educational programming, producing patient education, hosting podcasts, or engaging in policy writing regarding the health impacts of climate change. Below are some examples, but not requirements, of this white paper.
61 62 63		 i. Women's Leadership Committee could address the impact of climate change on female health by providing resources to members or a speaker on this topic.
64 65 66		 The DEI Advisory Group could host a podcast or speaking event at a conference addressing the impact of climate change on minority populations.
67 68		 Federal Legislation and Advocacy Committee to support policy that limits the health effects of climate change on Americans.
69	7.	Addressing Public Health through Legislation

a. The ACOFP Board of Governors will use this white paper to draft a letter encouraging the US Surgeon General to publish education addressing the health-related consequences of climate change following adoption of this white paper.

The ACOFP Board of Governors will monitor the impact of climate change on patients and inpatient/outpatient practices of family physicians and continue to develop policy and programming beyond that described in this white paper as necessary.
