SUBJECT: Sexual Assault Response Training for Physicians

RESOLUTION NO. 19

WHEREAS, traumatic events, including sexual abuse, are associated with long-term physical and psychological effects. The physical impact of trauma can be extensive and may involve somatization; changes in biology such as altered limbic system functioning, changes in the activity of the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis, and neurotransmitter-related dysregulation; hyperarousal and sleep disturbances; as well as altered cognition¹; and

WHEREAS, traumatic events may influence patients' health care experiences and engagement in preventative care²; and

WHEREAS, a sexual assault occurs every 73 seconds and a sexual assault on a pediatric victim occurs every 9 minutes within the United States, and, the lifetime rates of sexual assaults are between 17 - 18% for women & 3 % for men, and the evidence for Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) programs suggests improved outcomes in patient psychological recovery, treatment, evidence collection and prosecution of cases³; and

WHEREAS, there are 1,732 SANE certified nurses in the United States, and of those, 502 are registered to work with children, and according to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are 268,297 primary care physicians in the United States, which are in a prime position to provide a range of support for sexual assault victims⁴; and

WHEREAS, current forensic examinations are driven by trained Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANE) who are trained through the International Association of Forensic Nurses (IAFN); and

WHEREAS, SANE certification is available to nurses and advanced practice nurses; however, there is no equivalent certification for physicians or physician assistants³; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) explores pathways for physicians to become educated in the collection of forensic evidence in sexual assault cases and to gain competence in the examination of sexual assault survivors.
