RESOLUTION NO. 20

1 2	WHEREAS, the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) passed a resolution in 2014 stating support for education on the harmful effects of marijuana use (1); and
3 4	WHEREAS, marijuana is the second most commonly used mind-altering substance in the United States, widely legalized for medicinal <i>and</i> recreational use (2); and
5	WHEREAS, 19 million people met the criteria for marijuana use disorder in 2022 (2); and
6 7 8	WHEREAS, the National Institute on Drug Abuse identifies marijuana as an addictive drug and marijuana products have been shown to cause dependence, including the potential for withdrawal effects (2); and
9 10 11 12	WHEREAS, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) will cover 2 tobacco cessation attempts per year, with each attempt including a maximum of four intermediate or intensive sessions, with the total annual benefit covering up to 8 sessions in a 12-month period with the codes 99406 and 99407 (3); and
13 14	WHEREAS, Medicare covers these services in both inpatient and outpatient settings and now waves the deductible or copayment for patients, with net zero cost to patients (3); and
15 16	WHEREAS, tobacco cessation has significant health risk reduction benefits warranting the incentive for providers to counsel on cessation; and
17 18 19 20 21 22	WHEREAS, marijuana, although not yet as heavily researched as tobacco, has still been shown to also have long term negative health consequences including impacts on lung health, mental health (psychosis, schizophrenia, depression), cardiovascular effects (stroke, heart attack, arrhythmia), gastrointestinal issues (cannabinoid hyperemesis syndrome, PUD), concentration, memory, fetal complications in pregnancy, and cancer risk (throat, head and neck) (4) now, therefore be it
23 24	RESOLVED, that the American College of Osteopathic Family Physicians (ACOFP) encourages further research on marijuana and its potential health benefits and risks; and, be it further
25 26	RESOLVED, that the advocate for legislation requiring insurance companies to reimburse providers for marijuana cessation counseling; and, be it further
27 28	RESOLVED, that the ACOFP advocate that CMS reimburse physicians for marijuana cessation counseling in a similar way to tobacco cessation counseling; and, be it further
